DOUGLAS COUNTY

U.S. SENATE (2-YEAR TERM)

Pete Ricketts - Republican (Incumbent)

Top 3 Priorities if Re-elected: Securing the border, reducing federal spending, and making government more efficient and less bureaucratic.

Abortion: Does not support abortion and does not support giving taxpayer dollars to organizations that perform or refer for abortion services.

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should

be based on biological sex.

Border Security: Believes in restoring the “Remain in Mexico” policy, tightening the asylum process, and eliminating Biden’s abuse of parole.

Foreign Policy: Believes Israel is our strongest ally in the Middle East, and the U.S. should stand by our ally; Has criticized Biden’s slow response to weapons requests from Ukraine.

Preston Love Jr. - Democrat

Top 3 Priorities if Elected: Affordable healthcare, reproductive rights, and the advancement of Nebraska’s rural and urban economies.

Abortion: Advocate for abortion and works toward eliminating barriers to abortion services.

Border: Supports a path to citizenship for those who

want to contribute to our economy.

Healthcare: Supports universal healthcare coverage.

Foreign Policy: Believes both conflicts in Ukraine and Gaza represent situations where we are called to intervene to protect human rights and advocate for humanitarian outcomes.

U.S. SENATE (6-YEAR TERM)

Deb Fischer - Republican (Incumbent)

Top 3 Priorities if Re-elected: Passing and adequately funding the annual National Defense Authorization Act, passing a Farm Bill, and expanding access to paid family leave.

Abortion: Does not support abortion and does not support giving taxpayer dollars to organizations that perform or refer for abortion services.

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should

be based on biological sex.

Border: Supports resuming construction on the border wall, ending Catch-And-Release, and reinstating President Trump's Remain in Mexico Policy.

Foreign Policy: Voted against H.R. 2471 and H.R. 815 which sent \$13.6 billion and \$60 billion in aid for Ukraine; Believes in the long-standing U.S.-Israel alliance; and wants to ensure that we proudly stand behind one of our best allies in their greatest time of need.

Dan Osborne - Independent

Abortion: Does not support a national ban on abortion.

Foreign Policy: Supports sending funding to Ukraine; believes that Israel has a right to defend itself and thinks the U.S. should be working to broker a peace deal.

Border: Believes that illegal immigration creates a pool of cheap labor with no rights and is detrimental to every American worker.

U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

District 2

Don Bacon - Republican (Incumbent)

Abortion: Believes there should be exceptions for abortions in the case of rape, incest, and the health of the mother.

Gender Issues: Believes that participation in girls' sports and access to women's restrooms and locker rooms should be based on biological sex; voted for the Respect for Marriage Act which provided protections for same-sex marriage (believes the government should not dictate who can marry whom).

Border: Believes that immigration is an essential part of our nation's history and our economic growth, but it has

to be done legally; supports legislation to secure the border and reform the broken immigration system.

Foreign Policy: Supports further funding for Ukraine; believes that it is in our national security interest that Ukraine remain independent; Believes the United States needs to do whatever it can to support Israel.

Election Integrity: Voted to create a congressional committee to investigate January 6th protestors; believes that Trump should have respected the results of the 2020 election.

Tony Vargas - Democrat

Abortion: Will work to pass legislation making the right to an abortion part of federal law.

Gender Issues: Supports gender mutilation surgeries and procedures for minors; supports biological boys

competing in girls' sports.

Border: Supports stopping fentanyl trafficking, boosting processing capacity for immigration cases, and creating a pathway to citizenship.

NEBRASKA LEGISLATURE

District 5

Margo R. Juarez - Democrat

School Funding: Opposes opportunity scholarships that help provide school choice for students; and wants to pursue property tax relief with solutions that keep public schools strong.

Long-Term Care for Seniors: Feels there needs to be

more options for seniors and more social workers.

Taxes: Believes that property taxes are too high; and wants to explore options that allow for collecting more taxes from wealthy citizens in Nebraska.

Gilbert Ayala - Republican

Abortion: States that he is pro-life.
Gender Issues: Opposes same-sex marriage.
2nd Amendment: Calls himself a second amendment candidate.
Border: Supports using some taxpayer money to

support border states.
School Funding: Supports opportunity scholarships that help provide school choice for students; and supports charter schools.

District 7

Dunixi Guereca - Democrat

Government Operation: Opposes the privatization of state services.
Unions: Firmly believes that everyone deserves the right to unionize; believes unions are the pathway to the middle class and a dignified retirement; and would

support a bill expanding public sector bargaining to include legislative and judicial branch employees.
School Funding: Supports keeping our public schools strong; and opposes opportunity scholarships that help provide school choice for students.

Tim C. Pendrell - Democrat

Taxes: Concerned about the cuts in the budget that will have to be made to afford the proposed property tax relief.

Government Operations: Opposes the privatization or contracting of out-of-state services to private companies.

District 9

John Cavanaugh Jr. - Democrat (Incumbent)

Abortion: Supports abortion; and voted against LB574 which established a 12-week abortion ban in Nebraska.
School Funding: Strongly opposes efforts to fund private schools with public dollars; opposes opportunity scholarships that help provide school choice for

students.
Gender Issues: Voted against LB574 and LB575 which banned gender mutilation surgeries for minors and prevented biological boys from competing in girls' sports.

Julia K. Palzer - Republican

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex.
Law Enforcement: Wants to provide more support to

law enforcement.
Healthcare: Wants to improve access to mental health treatment.

District 13

Nick Batter – Independent.

Tax Reform: Supports property tax relief but only for those who bring value to Nebraska.
Education: Provide competitive pay for educators.

Criminal Justice: Wants to decriminalize marijuana use by adults on private property.

Ashlei Spivey - Democrat

Abortion: Advocate for abortion rights; founder and current executive director of the only reproductive justice organization in Nebraska
Gender Issues: Advocated against LB575 which

prevented biological boys from competing in girls' sports.
Public Health: Wants to prioritize policy that supports clean energy and sustainable climate action for Nebraska.

District 15

Dave Wordekemper - Republican

Abortion: Pro-life; and opposes amending the constitution to create a right to abortion.

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex; and supports banning

gender mutilation surgeries and procedures for minors.

Criminal Justice Reform: Supports increasing penalties for drug crimes.

Taxes: Supports restricting valuation hikes due to foreign investors; and wants to stop unfunded mandates.

Roxie Kracl - Republican

Abortion: Pro-life; and opposes amending the Nebraska Constitution to create a right to abortion.

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex; and supports banning gender mutilation surgeries and procedures for minors.

School Choice: Supports policies that enable parents to send their children to the school that best suits their child's needs.

Governance: Wants to stop government control over small businesses.

District 31

Kathleen Kauth - Republican (Incumbent)

Abortion: Worked to amend LB 574 to provide for a ban on abortions after 12 weeks and allow for exceptions for the mother's life.

Gender Issues: Introduced LB574 and LB575 which banned gender mutilation surgeries for minors and prevented biological boys from competing in girls' sports.

School Choice: Supports school choice and voted to pass education scholarships allowing parents more choice in deciding where to send their children to school.

Taxes: Worked to cut income taxes and eliminate taxes on Social Security; supported legislation to provide a child care tax credit to families.

Mary Ann Folchert - Democrat

Abortion: Supports abortion

Education: Believes public schools rely too heavily on property tax revenue and would like to explore other sustainable long-term funding options.

2nd Amendment: Supports raising the minimum age

Abortion: Supports abortion.

Education: Believes public schools rely too heavily on property tax revenue and would like to explore other

sustainable long-term funding options.

2nd Amendment: Supports raising the minimum age to purchase certain types of weapons.

School Choice: Advocated against legislation that would provide education scholarships allowing parents more choice in deciding where to send their children to school

District 39

Tony Sorrentino - Republican

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex; and supports banning gender mutilation surgeries and procedures for minors.

School Choice: Supports policies that enable parents to

send their children to the school that best suits their child's needs.

Taxes: Believes we need to find alternatives to the current taxing system to fund public education; and opposes the EPIC Option (consumption tax).

Allison Heimes – Independent

Mental Health: Plans to introduce legislation that would expand mental health wings in hospitals and create crisis intervention teams.

Taxes: Wants to explore offering tax incentives to businesses that offer childcare options for employees..

Veterans: Advocated for LB261 which honors deceased National Guard service men and women.

School Funding: Opposes opportunity scholarships that help provide school choice for students.

NEBRASKA STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

District 3

Lisa Schonhoff - Republican

Abortion: Pro-life; and believes that students should be taught, at age-appropriate levels, that pre-born babies are individual human beings.

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex.

Curriculum: Opposes implementing health curriculum

that promotes transgender ideology; and opposes the implementation of Critical Race Theory in schools.

Parental Involvement: Believes parents should have access to all books and learning materials used in instruction; and supports school choice and charter schools.

Bill McAllister - Republican

Abortion: Pro-life; and believes that students should be taught, at age-appropriate levels, that pre-born babies are individual human beings.

Gender Issues: Believes participation in athletic activities and access to restrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex.

Curriculum: Opposes implementing health curriculum that promotes transgender ideology; and opposes the implementation of Critical Race Theory in school.

Parental Involvement: Believes that parents are the primary educators for their children; and supports school choice.

District 4

Liz Renner - Democrat

School Funding: Opposes opportunity scholarships allowing parents more choice in deciding where to send their children to school.

School Libraries: Advocated against LB441, which

would have helped remove sexually explicit material from school libraries.

Student Mental Health: Wants more effective counselor-to-student ratios in schools.

LeDonna White Griffin - Independent

Abortion: Pro-life; and believes that students should be taught, at age-appropriate levels, that pre-born babies are individual human beings.

School Choice: Wants to focus on parent choice to educate their children as they see best.

Gender Issues: Believes that participation in girls'

sports and access to girls' bathrooms/locker rooms should be based on biological sex.

Parent Involvement: Believes that parent choice empowers parents to know they are the first teachers; and supports allowing parents to easily access all books and learning materials used for student instruction.

NEBRASKA BOARD OF REGENTS

District 4

Elizabeth R. O'Connor - Democrat (Incumbent)

Tuition: Voted to implement the Nebraska Promise (free tuition for families making less than \$65,000 per year).

Research: Wants to continue to expand efforts to bring in research dollars; and wants to encourage aggressive and creative applications for federal grants.

1st Amendment Rights on Campus: Believes that a university must be a place where academic freedom and open dialogue are protected; and believes in balancing this need with prohibiting hate speech and threats of violence.

Jim Rogers - Republican

1st Amendment Rights on Campus: Believes in embracing the free and open study of ideas while abstaining from partisan advocacy of ideas; and believes that no campus speech should be banned.

University Mission: Believes that the Nebraska

University system currently lacks an operative mission statement; and wants to work to create a proper mission statement to define the proper role of the university and better direct decision-making.

District 8

Barbara Weitz - Democrat (Incumbent)

Tuition: Voted to implement the Nebraska Promise (free tuition for families making less than \$65,000 per year).
Programming: Supports adding certificate programs that will retrain or provide advanced training for our workforce.
Funding: Concerned about finding a way to cover the potential \$54 million shortfall without raising tuition rates.

Zachary Mellender - Independent

Student Retention: Wants to find ways to retain college graduates in the state of Nebraska; and wants to work to place graduates in good jobs in Nebraska.
Tuition: Wants to work to reduce tuition for in-state students.
1st Amendment Rights on Campus: Believes the most critical use of the 1st Amendment and free speech is on college campuses.
Innovation: Wants to revive the Nebraska University System as an innovation hub; and wants investment in cutting-edge programs and continued collaboration with local companies.

METROPOLITAN COMMUNITY COLLEGE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

District 2

Brad Ashby - Republican (Incumbent)

Endorsed by Women Who Run Nebraska (a progressive political action committee) No additional information available.

District 3

Adam Gotschall - Republican (Incumbent)

Trades: Wants to work with high schools and middle schools to allow professionals with trade certifications and licenses to teach trades classes before graduation.
Graduation: Working to connect employers with students to help increase employment rates for graduates.

Lynae Tucker-Chellew - Republican

Endorsed by Women Who Run Nebraska (a progressive political action committee).
Trades: Would like to work directly with students and faculty to increase awareness and passion for the trades.
Curriculum: Increased access to dual enrollment opportunities.

DOUGLAS COUNTY COMMISSIONER

District 5

Sean Kelly - Republican

Public Engagement: Believes that any issues discussed in a public forum on the board should provide the public an opportunity to comment.
Budget: County government should endeavor to provide the best services available at the least cost at all times; and all county expenditures should be rigorously evaluated.
Public Safety: Juvenile justice should focus on prevention, support, and rehabilitation; opposes the Juvenile Justice Center project.

Brian J. Fahey - Democrat

County Services: Wants to protect healthcare and mental health access, fund public safety, and improve roads and bridges.

Budget: Wants to promote affordable and responsible budgeting.

PAPIO-MISSOURI RIVER NATURAL RESOURCES DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Subdistrict 1

Rodney Storm - Democrat

Water Quality and Quantity: Believes the board must work with all users of our resources to assist in developing or eliminating programs that will improve water quality; and there is no one-size-fits-all solution.

Budget: Believes the NRD should spend funds for planting trees, bike trails, and managing to preserve surface water in case of drought.

Platte River Recreational Lake/Canal Zone

Construction: Believes that there needs to be clear, unbiased studies showing the need and public support for this type of project.

Bonding Authority: Believes that the NRD should have the ability to issue bonds.

Shawn Mohr Melotz - Republican

Water Quality and Quantity: Advocates for a comprehensive plan utilizing practices such as lot level with Low Impact Development and Conservation Design; advocates for floodplain management practices that prohibit building in the floodplain; opposes the use of eminent domain; and opposes dams with permanent pools.

Budget: Believes that the NRD Board should spend funds on managing to preserve surface water in case of drought.

Platte River Recreational Lake/Canal Zone

Construction: Does not believe that there is a need for a recreational lake along the Platte River.

Bonding Authority: Opposes the bonding authority used by the Papio NRD; actively testified against the legislative bill that granted the bonding authority; and believes the bonding authority allows for excessive spending by the Papio NRD.

Subdistrict 3

Larry Bradley - Democrat (Incumbent)

Pat Bonnett - Republican (Incumbent)

Top Priorities: Completing the top 5 priority water projects (4,5, and 19 in Gretna, 12 at 180th and Forth, and Damsite 10 south of the Washington County line east of Bennington); these projects will help alleviate stormwater runoff and provide flood control.

Platte River Recreational Lake/Canal Zone

Construction: In favor of the proposal to build a recreational lake along the Platte River.

Bonding Authority: Believes the NRD should have restricted bonding for major pre-development capital improvement structures.

METROPOLITAN UTILITIES DISTRICT OF OMAHA

Subdivision 2

David Friend - Republican (Incumbent)

Natural and Cyber Security: Believes that MUD has a robust system to protect IT infrastructure; and was a member of a MUD committee selected to design and build a new construction and operations center to minimize disaster at the long-term operations center.

Streetcar: Opposed to MUD paying for any costs associated with moving gas and water infrastructure for

streetcar construction (unless those costs are already part of an established plan to upgrade infrastructure).

Infrastructure: Wants to continue replacing infrastructure as needed and according to established plans without saddling customers with costs not related to delivery of gas and water.

Patrick M. Brennan - Democrat

Infrastructure: Believes that the process of updating infrastructure should be based on where the repairs are needed the most, as well as when the capital expenditure would have an impact on lowering customers' rates in the future.

Budget: Advocates for maintaining MUD's peaking plants of LNG and propane air that enable MUD to avoid buying gas during frigid periods when the cost of gas increased substantially; and advocates in continuing to

participate in prepaid gas agreements that enable MUD to secure significant long-term fixed discounts on the cost of gas.

Climate Issues: Believes that every decision needs to be filtered through climate change thinking; and believes the natural gas industry needs to do a better job educating the public about natural gas being a transition fuel in clean energy

OMAHA PUBLIC POWER DISTRICT

Subdivision 8

Mike Cavanaugh - Republican (Incumbent)

Budget: Believes that OPPD needs to get 100% carbon-free power by 2050 without sacrificing grid safety and dependability; and believes the zero-emission initiative also must be done without negative financial impact and without losing customer confidence.

Zero Emissions by 2050 Initiative: Will not sacrifice grid security, dependability, nor burden customers with unnecessary cost; and believes the commitment to zero emissions by 2050 is the most important challenge facing OPPD.

Morgan Rye-Craft - Independent

Grid Demand: Believes the most important challenge facing OPPD is increased demand for reliable electricity; and wants to push for sustainable growth that can meet demand while keeping rates low.

Zero Emissions by 2050 Initiative: Believes that this goal is both necessary and possible; and believes OPPD

needs to establish milestone goals to ensure progress while keeping the public informed.

Rolling Blackout Mitigation: Believes we need a diverse energy grid; and wants to pursue additional renewable energy projects that will ensure reliability and cost-effectiveness.

REGIONAL METROPOLITAN TRANSIT BOARD OF OMAHA

District 1

Cornelius Williams - Democrat

Previous member of the Learning Community Coordination Council.

District 2

Clarice Dombeck - Independent

Ridership: Advocates for more frequent bus arrivals, better bus stops, including passenger shelters, and more route information to help increase the number of riders.

Routes: Wants to achieve a multimodal system that supports equitable access and safe movement for everyone; wants easy transfers between buses, the streetcar, and bike share systems; and wants to focus

on underserved communities with routes and schedules designed to prioritize Black, Indigenous, and Communities of Color.

Infrastructure: Wants greener vehicles to prioritize environmentally friendly options like electric buses, light rail, and expanded walking and biking infrastructure.

David Levy - Independent

Ridership: Wants to make availability and routes known; wants to offer reliable and frequent service; and wants to partner with large trip generators in the community to help increase the number of riders.

Routes: Believes that the board must look at land use and opportunities in the region and match the transit system to that.

Challenges to Public Transportation: Believes that reputation and reliability are the most important challenges to our public transportation system; wants to focus on strategic media and marketing to address the reputation; and wants to address reliability through strategic design, staff training, constant monitoring, and partnerships with other regional entities.

District 3

John G. Sullivan - Republican

Routes: As adjacent cities make their requests to join the Regional Metro Transit Authority, their requests should be carefully considered by the board, and where participation would be fruitful for all parties they should be strongly considered.

Challenges to Public Transportation: Believes that managing growth, workforce recruitment, and fiduciary duty to the public are the most important challenges facing our public transportation systems.

Yanira Garcia - Democrat

Ridership: Wants to focus on inclusivity and accessibility to help increase ridership.

Routes: Believes that if adding other cities to the public

transit system meets the needs of a vast majority of commuters in the area, then it is worth discussing the opportunities.

District 4

Daniel Padilla - Democrat

Ridership: wants to foster innovation and collaboration to ensure Metro Transit remains accessible, equitable, and integrated into the community.

Routes: wants to expand Metro Transit services to include Fremont, Lincoln, and Blair to help alleviate traffic

Challenges to Public Transportation: wants to implement urban design strategies that to reduce reliance on cars, enhance land use efficiency, and create a more bicycle and pedestrian friendly city.

Scott Dobbe - Independent

Ridership: Wants to focus on rider experience by extending service, enhancing frequency, earning trust with on-time reliability, and respecting riders as valued customers to help grow ridership.

Routes: Will study the data to support expansion where it makes the most sense, responsibly stewarding civic resources while ensuring high-quality connectivity

throughout the city.

Challenges to Public Transportation: Believes the driver shortage is the most important challenge facing the public transportation system; and wants to focus on personnel recruitment and retention to help improve on-time performance.

District 5

Josh Corrigan - Democrat

Ridership: Wants to remove barriers for everyone including seniors and riders with disabilities to make a more accessible system.

Routes: Wants to ensure that our existing system is capable of growing to serve the region; and wants to identify sustainable ways to make connections to important

areas before expanding services.

Challenges to Public Transportation: Believes limited funding for transit will make it impossible to grow; and wants to work toward a responsible funding level that can sustain our public transportation system into the future.

John McCann - Republican

Ridership: Wants to increase available stops to larger areas of communities with limited and expensive parking.

Routes: Wants to make public transit available to other small communities such as Fremont, Blair, Yutan,

Plattsmouth, and even Lincoln.

Challenges to Public Transportation: Believes the most important challenges facing public transportation are keeping it safe and affordable to ride.

OMAHA PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Subdistrict 3

Nick Thielen - Democrat (Incumbent)

Elected to the board in 2020. Focused on providing support for quality early childhood education. Wants to leverage partnerships that expand before and after

school learning opportunities. Abruptly resigned from the district's superintendent search committee during the superintendent transition.

Paul Anderson - Republican

No additional information available.

Subdistrict 5

Spencer Head - Republican (Incumbent)

Believes that parents, teachers, and administrators should provide limitations on student access to sexually explicit materials. Also supports the Omaha Public Schools policy that allows for challenges to materials that individuals may find offense with. Believes that the State should provide a greater percentage of school

funding to reduce the amount of local property taxes the schools need to operate. Thinks that bathrooms and locker rooms should be utilized according to gender at birth; and believes that we need to protect our female athletes.

Gini Magnuson - Democrat

Believes that staff members should not be vilified or criminalized for the contents of the library. Believes that parents and caregivers should be involved in and support their children's education outside of the classroom and be responsive to their children's teachers

and educators. Wants to seek out and strengthen partnerships with community colleges, trade schools, and state universities to help students find affordable, attainable education.

Subdistrict 9

Erik Servllon - Democrat

Currently the Development and Communications Director for OneWorld Community Health Centers. Also served on the Douglas-Sarpy Learning Community Coordinating Council and was part of the legislative staff for Sen. Tony Vargas.

Kimara Snipes - Democrat

Previously a member of the board. Current Executive Director for One Omaha. Extensive history of working with and mobilizing neighborhood associations.

ELKHORN BOARD OF EDUCATION

Renee Vokt - Republican (Incumbent)

Elected to the board in 2016. Sits on the American Civics and Curriculum Committee. Renee also serves on several Elkhorn High School booster clubs and the Elkhorn Public Schools Foundation Board.

Scot Ringenberg - Republican (Incumbent)

Elected to the board in 2020. Chairperson of the Board Policy Committee and serves as a member of the Building and Grounds Committee and Finance and Insurance Committee. Currently involved in a controversy concerning a board policy decision involving a disabled student.

Brett Elliott - Republican

Elkhorn businessman. Focused on advocating for skilled trades, continued student achievement and excellence, partnership with parents and the Elkhorn community, transparency, accountability, and respect for taxpayers, and teacher retention and recruitment.

Jennifer Shatel - Republican (Incumbent)

Elected to the board in 2020. Chairperson of the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Finance and Insurance Committee. Jennifer also serves on the Board Policy Committee.

MILLARD BOARD OF EDUCATION

Allison Kinney-Walker - Democrat

College professor and public school volunteer. Wants to provide support for current teachers and staff, find creative ways to recruit and retain the best teachers, and support students to ensure they have what they need to be successful. Does not support efforts to remove sexually explicit materials from school libraries. Endorsed by Women Who Run Nebraska (a progressive political action committee).

Linda Poole - Republican (Incumbent)
